# Jamghat in Delhi:

## Quick Overview

- Consists of a boys' shelter (Aman), girls' shelter (Aanchal), and day center (Aangan)
- Provides safe recreation, warm meals, bathing facilities, tutoring services, and vocational training to children in the area
- Kids in the 24 hr shelters attend a full-time public English-medium school in the area
- They are supplemented with tutoring and vocational training based on their interests

# Aman

## Boy's 24 hr Shelter

- Asha has been funding for the past 2 years
- **Provides meals, tutoring, vocational training, shelter, medical treatment, bathing facilities, theater-training**
- They go on field trips
- **Vocational training includes funding computer courses**
- Boys undergo traditional schooling; a regular public English medium school
  - Study at the Life Centre Academy in Dhaula Kuan, New Delhi
- **Currently houses 15 boys, ages 6- 15 years old**
  - Maximum capacity
  - Some overcoming alcohol and drug addictions
  - From “broken families”
- 2 full time staff members
  - Regular tuition classes at the center with Ms. Papia Das
- Recently acquired financial support from the US funding organization iPartner

# **Aanchal**

## **Girls' 24 hr Shelter**

- **Houses 10 girls currently**
  - full capacity
- Run since October 2010
- Aim to reconcile the girls with their families
- All girls go to a regular public school
- Girls are given informal education, counseling, a place for pursuing hobbies, traditional education as well
- Girls are chosen after field work and approved by child welfare organizations to live at Jamghat
- **Recently acquired support from French funding organization CODEGAZ at the beginning of 2011**

# Aangan

## children's day center

- Supported by the Max India Foundation
- Provides daytime shelter and...
  - meals
  - tutoring
  - informal education
  - recreation
  - medical services and vaccinations
  - bathing facilities
- 9 AM to 6 PM
- Formal and non-formal educational opportunities
- Activities; Games; Workshops; Arts; Sexual education; Literary activities
- Jamghat strives to enroll these children in regular schools or the National Institute of Open Schooling
- These children live near the Jama Masjid, and either live in the slums or are homeless

# **Ekjut**

## **vocational side project**

- Make and sell bags, purses, wallets
- Meant to provide vocations to the kids, as well to allow for Jamghat's self-sustainability
- Children learn how to stitch, part of their vocational training
  - Two girls from the Aanchal home have been trained to work here

# **Jamghat's Social Awareness Work: Night Walk**

- Occurs in the spring, in March
- Faciliates awareness and understanding of the plight of children living on the streets
- Latest Night Walk also distributed blankets to the homeless in the Old Delhi area:

# Current Sources of Funding

- The Asha St. Louis chapter
  - Stated they were considering giving up to \$10,000 for the Aangan Day Shelter
  - Showcased Jamghat at a donor dinner and accumulated this amount
- French funding organization CODEGAZ began extending support to Aanchal Children's Home for Girls at the beginning of 2011
  - Fully covers the necessary funding for Aanchal up until June 2012
- US based funding organization iPartner began extending support to Aman in beginning of 2011
  - Is continuing to support



# Recent Developments

- Jamghat had live media coverage by CNN IBN during a December 2011 Night Walk... reached out to a lot of people
  - Resulted in an influx of donors and skilled volunteers
- In November 2011, CODEGAZ made a video showcasing Jamghat: <http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=ekZRdimVq6Y>
- In February 2012, Arbaz (12 years) and Prasanjeet (15 years) participated in a play at the India Habitat Center in New Delhi on “Global Warming”
- End of term exams in March 2012– all children perform well
  - Four boys received marks above 85%
- Trip to Akshardham temple in March 2012 with tutor, Ms. Das as a reward for good exam results

# Necessary Projected Funding

- They are asking for funding the boy's shelter
- They need funding for educational expenses, medical expenses, staff salaries, and educational outings
- Jamghat only has funding to operate until the end of this year (according to them)

# **Q: How old are the children when they leave, and what happens to them once they leave? What other vocational skills are the older children learning?**

- Children stay in the home until 18 years of age
  - Jamghat starts planning for vocational training at 15 years of age
  - They encourage children to pursue their interests
1. Rafiq (18 years) was restored to his family;
    - a) he is pursuing a computer training course
    - b) Jamghat will continue to support him until he completes it and gets a job
  2. Rajiv (17 years) is the eldest boy in Aman
    - c) he is pursuing a computer hardware and software course
    - d) Jamghat is planning to arrange an internship for him to achieve practical knowledge
  3. Prasanjeet (15 years) is interested in theater activities
    - e) He is participating in various plays and dramas organized by Jamghat

**Q: How is the textile program going? Are you making money off the sales of bags? How many of the children are being taught sewing?**

- Ekjut is part of the vocational training unit
- Jamghat organizes stalls where they sell their goods at craft fairs, colleges, and corporate centers that support the center
- The income generated goes back to being utilized in the programs
- Two elder girls from Aanchal and two elder boys from Aman are involved here
  - The boys are interested in computers and are undergoing training
  - The two girls, Ushma (15 years) and Rubina (15 years) get regular training in jute bag making
