3. Brifly describe the motivation for starting the group:

Digambarpur Angikar established in the year 1979 by a group of dedicated social activist of Sundarban region with a view to undertake relief and rehabilitation as well as development initiatives for empowerment of women and children and other vulnerable sections of socio-economically backward SC/ST/OBC/Minority communities. Since inception the organisation is involved in rural development and social action programmes ,including providing basic education services for the marginalised and establishing women and child rights in the Sundarban region.

4. Briefly describe the aim of the group:

Digambarpur Angikar, a registered non-government organization based in Sundarban region established in the year 1979 with the focused interventions of Child Care & Protection, Education for children, Health & Nutrition, Sustainable livelihoods for the marginalized women, Climate resilient agricultural practices, Water & Sanitation and Solid waste management.

Vision statement: Visualized an egalitarian society where people irrespective of caste, creed & religion can enjoy their basic human rights with equal access to resources for quality in life and livelihood

Mission statement: Strengthen the empowerment process among the most vulnerable children, Youth, Women & aged so that they can realize and protect their basic human rights & economic stability.

Goal: Committed to work on the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) with the overarching aim of empowering women, children, and other vulnerable communities in the coastal Sundarban region by equipping these target communities to become self-sufficient in all respects of life.

6. What non education-related community development activities is your group involved in:

- a) Child Care & Protection: Institutinal srvices: Angikar is presently running six different catagories residential shelter homes [Safety, Protection, Education & rehabilitation] with 50 destitute girls under Cottage Scheme, 150 CNCP [Child Need Care and Protection] Girls, 50 CNCP Boys, 50 CWSN [Children With Special Need] Boys, 10 baby for SAA [Special Adoption Agency] under JJ Act . The Directorate of Social Welfare, Child Rights & Trafficking, Government of West Bengal providing support for running all these different category shelter homes. Implementing Child protection and STOP child marriage campaign at 200 vulnerable villages in South 24 PGS District in partnership with Kailash SatyarthiChildren,s Foundation.
 - Child Rights and Protection: Non Institutional services: Promotes child rights and strengthens
 child protection mechanisms to combat child marriage, trafficking, sexual abuse, and child
 labor in 200 vulnerable villages across 7 blocks in South 24 Parganas under the Access to
 Justice Programme.

• Implementing anti human trafficking to promote save village for the vulnerable adolescent girls in Sundarban in partnership with My chioces Foundation.

b) Health & well beings:

- HIV/AIDS Prevention: Implements two separate Targeted Intervention Projects for Commercial Sex Workers and the TG/ MSM community in South and North 24 Parganas, focusing on STIs and HIV detection and treatment and promoting safe sex practices.
- Runs a Waiting Hut Programme for pregnant mothers at Gosaba in the Sundarbans to reduce child mortality by providing closer access to health centers. In last year, hundreds of pregnant mothers avail this temporary staying facility prior their delivery and all of them deliver healthy and safe child.
- SRHR Intervention: Angikar is implementign a three years duration Sexual & Reproductive Health Rights [SRHR] among the adolescent & fisher women's at 50 marginalised villahges in Sundarban deltaic region, West Bengal, India.

c) Water and Sanitation:

- Digambarpur Angikar built water tank and established a pipeline system to supply safe drinking water to 720 households, managed by a community-led Water User Committee (WUC).
- As partner of Nirmal Bangla, the organization supports Swachh Bharat Mission (SBM) by conducting community awareness campaigns, building and monitoring household toilets, educating on night soil usage, building toilet blocks in schools and promoting water supply in them.
- As a Micro Planning Associate Organization with the State Urban Development Agency (SUDA), DigambarpurAngikar prepared Solid Waste Management-Detailed Project Reports (SWM-DPR) for 29 municipal towns in West Bengal reaching over .5 million urban residents in 565 municipal wards.

d) Livelihood:

- Promotes sustainable livelihood opportunities for 2000 TCW families, Scheduled Castes, and Scheduled Tribes through climate-resilient practices in agriculture, fishery, and livestock management, with a focus on poultry and goat farming.
- Focuses on improving rural incomes through modern bio-farming practices, soil conservation, livestock and animal husbandry development, and sustainable market linkages.

e) Shelter home for vulnerable people:

- Operates SHAKTI SADAN, a shelter home for women aged 18 to 60 who are victims of social and economic marginalization, in partnership with Mission Shakti and the Ministry of Women and Child Development.
- Runs a Shelter Home under ASHRAY for urban homeless people including both women and men to ensure a comfortable living experience.
- Running Senior Citizen Home under (AVYAY) to the 25 elderly women by arranging shelter, food, healthcare and recreational amenities.

List of schools run by our organisation: Status of this year:2025-26.

- Angikar Kishalaya Niketan, a upper primary standard education centre with 372 nos poor and marginalised students [Boys: 186 & Girls: 186] at Digambarpur, Patharpratima, South 24 Parganas.Recently in partnership with Edu Co we are expanding the schol building with infrastructural grant support.
- 2. Pre primary schools with 195 students [Boys: 99 & Girls:96] at Ghutiary Sharif and 96 students [Boys: 49 & Girls:47] in Mallickpur, South 24 Parganas. Total 248 students...
- 3. Basic backup education support project with 150 victim girl children [Children Need Care & Protectin], 50 CNCP Boys and 50 CWSN Boys [Children with special Need category] residing Angikar run shelter homes.

Since last couple of years, Angikar is running upper primary standard school: Angikar Kishalay Niketan with a group of present 372 marginalised children at Patharpratima and running preprimary standard schools with present 291 non-school going and dropout children, children of sex workers and slum dwellers at Ghutiary Sharif and Mallickpur slum focus locations in South 24 Parganas district. Both these schools are running full fledge with active partnership and cooperation from community, guardians and local stakeholders. Apart from regular classes, extracurricular activities are also performing by the students. Recently in partnership with Edu Co we are expanding the school building at Angikar Kishalaya Niketan School with infrastructural grant support and extended the standard till class-VI standard.

Digambarpur Angikar is also running shelter homes for vulnerable CNCP/CWSN girls and boys since last couple of years. Majority of these victim children are rescued from different places in India and send to our shelter home for taking safe shelter for time being. Every year, on an average 700 to 750 such category victim children took temporary shelter in our different catagoroes shelter homes. Childrens are here exposed basic education followed by enrolled in nearby Government schools to continue their education.

Angikar **propsose funding** for continuation ongoing education activities for the marginalised children of Sundarban to continue their education:

- Angikar Kishalaya Niketan: At present a number of total student strengh is 372 supported by increased 10 teachers. We do expect financial support for continung existing improved school with teachers salary, education materials [Propose Items: Subject specific Text book, notebook, pencil, Ereser, Sharpener, Crayon, Drawing book] and Organizing monthly Mother's meetings [Topic of discussion: Importance on education, parental role, Personal care & child health, hygeine, Timely immunization & health referral]. We would also provide time to time toileratise and ensuring regular health check up by qualified doctors.
- Pre-Primary education Centre: At present total student strength is 291, covering of all centres, supported by 7 teachers & 3 Ayas. One accountant cum supervisor is also there for effective monitorign and resource mobilization. This year,we do expect financial support for continuing existing all these education centres: Especially for teachers salary, education materials [Propose Items: Subject specific Text book, notebook, pencil, Eraser ,Sharpener, Crayon, Drawing book], Cooked nutritious food for all children [propose Items: Rice, dal, seasonable vegetable, Soyabean, weekly egg, chicken] School uniform, shoes, school bag for all children [once in a year]. We would also provide quarterly Hygienic kits to all children, [Propose Items: Tooth Paste, Tooth Brush, Soap, Nail cutter, Comb],regular health check up by qualified doctor, Organizing Mother's meetings [Topic of discussion: Importance on education, parental role, Personal care & child health, hygiene and timely immunization & health referral].

9. Specify the type of education provided (e.g. basic literacy, vocational training etc.).

- Upper Primary standard school for non school going ,drop out and working children of age group 6+ to 14 years. Focus of education: Basic literacy, numeracy and skills for better life and knowledge related to: gender, health, nutrition and lifeskill education.
- Pre- KG standard school for non school going, drop out and working children of age group: 3
 to 6 years. Focus of education: Basic literacy, numeracy and skills for better life and
 knowledge related to: gender, health, nutrition and lifeskill education.

10. Please tell us about your teaching techniques (conventional vs. alternative).

- We have adopted innovative, participatory and attractive teaching curricular by arranging classroom teaching methodology. Existing centre teachers are experience and taking classes using pictorial message boards. We are intended to develop our first generation learner groups healthy, well-nourished and ready to participate and learn to upper standard of education and mainstream. Gradually centre teachers are motivating parents of these children and entire communities for positive response towards basic education learning services. Centres are also creates healthy and supportive environment of schooling in safe, protective and gender-sensitive environment. Attempts have been made to ensuring active involvement among the parents and make them responsible towards their kids' education. STEM learning initiatives have also introducing using computer and Power point presentation methodologies.
- Inside shelter home, for the residential inmates children, providing regular backup education services following attempts to enrol them in local schools to continue their formal education. Angikar always encourage these inmates to continue their education and empower to become self-sufficient in future. We also introduce self-defence mechanism, skill training and trauma reduction Jumba dance therapy movement. Side by side introducing special education services for the Children with Special Need category victim children.

11. What is the literacy rate in your local community?

Existing Literacy rate among the local community is around 82% as per census data. Literacy
rate among the victim children coming to our shelter home are vary from inmates to
inmates. But is seen majority of them are literate. Literacy rate among the Commercially Sex
Workers [CSWs] is around 10 to 15% and surrounding village community and slum dwellers
is around 50%.

12. Describe the socio-economic background of the children and their parents (e.g. education, occupational). If any of your students are employed, please tell us about that as well.

In general, apart from Agriculture, alternative livelihood oppertunities in the project areas of sundarban zone are very limited. Due to frequent natural calamities, opportunity of alternative livelihoods has reduces drastically. Earlier ,Amphan/Yaas incident and long time Covid-19 lock down also hits negative impact to earn alternative livelihood options in the locality. Typically in the delta region rain-fed, single-crop agriculture and fishing are the two main sources of livelihood. Nearly 75% per cent of the population still are primarily depend on agriculture. About 50 per cent of agriculturists are landless labourers. For the blocks bordering the reserve forest, during agricultural lean season, substantial part of the population depends on forest and river resources. Every years during April - May, some people enter the forests with permits for collection of honey and bee-wax which is partly purchased back by Forest Department. Besides, some households entirely and some partially engage in catching fish and crab in the rivers and creeks. Both of these operations are

- perceived to involve considerable danger due to tigers in the forest and crocodiles in the rivers. It can be perceived that these people directly depend on the forest as a last resort for their livelihood and are almost always very poor with nil or unsustainable landholding.
- Income from these occupations is often supplemented by catching "meen" [seeds of tiger prown], the local term for shrimp seedlings. The spawns of tiger prawn, which are hatched in these saline waters are much in demand by the inland prawn farms and fetch hard cash for the poor. A large section of women and children from poor households catch these tiny prawn seedlings with fine nets, which are then sold to 'bheries' (water bodies for growing fish) to grow in brackish water. Seasoal migration is also a concern in the locality. Earlier due to lengthey COVID-19 lock down and Amphan/Yaas cyclone disaster people are still suffering with lack of alternative livelihood oppertunities and economic vulnerability.

13. In addition to education, does your group provide any other services to the children in your schools (e.g. food, health care, clothing, etc.)?

 Nutritious cooked food, hygeinic kits, education material, clothing & legal support for the shelter home inmates and regular health care supports are provided to the children. Also providing trauma reduction counselling & skill development effort to mainstrem into larget society.

18. How many children have gone through your program in the past five years and what are they doing currently? Please tell us about their future education and employment possibilities.

- 1. Angikar Kishalaya Niketan: A number of total 186 students passd out from our education centre are enrolled in local public schools for continuing higher education.
- 2. Pre-KG School for infants of CSWs and other socially excluded community: In last five years, total 378 children from our Pre-KG school are enroll in nearby SSKs and Primary schhols and continue their education.

- Many of our ex-students are doing Nurse, Paramedial ,Engineering and studying at college level.
- Some of our ex-students are got services in postal department, schools, civil defence and private sectors.

19. Do you help your students with their future education efforts after they have passed out of your school?

 Angikar constaltly support to our pass out students to admit in local/nearby Government aided public schools for continuing education. We do also follow up them for next six months to one year after passed out from our schools. For the shelter home inmates it is mandatory to do follow up atleast for next one year after their restoration to their family.

21. Is your program different from that provided at these schools? Please explain

- Angikar is successfully running upper primary and pre primary standard non formal education centre at strategic locations in Sundarban since 2003. At present in this academic session, at our Upper primary centre strength of our student is: 372. & Pre-Primary centres, student strength is: 291. Student strength is gradually increasing every year. Children generally enroll in our school for equipping them with proper schooling by inculcating reading, writing, numerical, counting abilities, life skills, general knowledge, hygienic behaviour, cultural talents and importance of maintaining discipline life. All these components are different from existing formal schoolings. Followings are the ongoing activities:
 - o Four hours classroom teaching sessions and providing basic education to all major subjects.
 - o Arranged Life skill and art craft classes once a week.
 - o Providing nutritious cooked food for Pre-KG students.
 - o Awareness on personal hygiene, adolescent health care.
 - o Monthly tracking through parent's meeting: Parents involvement and ownership building.
 - o Proper tracking of education progress to each students.
 - o Initiate STEM learning facilities to crate learning interest.
 - o Attempts has been made to leach english from very childhood.

After competition of upper primary level education from this education centre the passed out students gets admitted in the nearby Govt aided schools and performing well. The organization is providing necessary support for contacting with the school authorities and admission of passed out children. We generally do follow up of our passed out students for next one year.

Our existing teaching technique is learning through playing, learning in doing, story telling, recitation, songs and dance, artwork etc. Joyfull teaching learning mathodologies and usages of social media channel makes us different. Student keeps the education centre neat and clean. Formation & strengthen child cabinet is also an unique component in out school to make the children responsible. Parents of the target students share their expectations with the education

committee members. So they have gained capacity to assess the progress and put suggestion in the decision-making meetings. Systamatic monitoring mechanism, Joyfull teaching techniques, constant tracking of progress, attempts to involve the guardians in education system and our committed staff makes us different from other education institutions.

• Scope of computer learning and english vocubulay skill from very childhood create interest among the guardians as well as students too to attend schoolon regular basis.

22. Why are the children in your school/s not attending government/other schools in the local area?

- Our school provides quality education, with safe environment and nutritious cooked food to the Pre-KG children in our school. Teachers keep regular contact with all students and tracking their progress and consult with parents for taking care in the home. Teachers do regular home visit for follow up and provides need based education support. Monthly Parent- Teacher meeting is an integral component in our school to ensure guardian's participation and make them accountable towards their kids' education. Every year the passed out students of our school scored good results in upper classes, which motivate and create positive impact on guardians and students about our school.
- Angikar also gathered the pass out students in our annual cultural event to share their good experience and motivate the juniors to continue their good education. Few retired teachers offer their voluntary services for teaching subjects as per requirement. Constant follow up and personal contact with each individual students is another focus areas in our schools.
- We are focusing on digital learning and English vocabulary skill, which are also creating interest among the community people to send their kids to our schools.

23. Do you try to involve the parents of the children in the running of the school (e.g. in setting the syllabus etc.)? Please specify.

• At every centre we have structure mother's committees who meet time to time with teachers and take note of progress, problems and challenges of their respective kids. These committee look after that the school is running properly with quality teaching methodology. Generally we do organize mothly parent- teacher meeting to ensure guardian participation in decession making process. Inside shelter home a structuer home management committee exist to look after safety ,education and care isseus for the inmates. Parents particularly the mothers are regularly keeping touch with the teachers when they are coming to school to pickup their wards.

24. What are your expansion plans for the future (e.g. adding more classes or schools)?

 We have expansion our upper primary school upto middle standard [class-V standard] and introduced digital literacy. Also attempts has been made to improve english speacking and vocubulery skills among the students for better engligh learning among the students. In partnership with Edu Co we have extended a new building at Patharpratma to explore more number of students and run a full fledge english mediaum school at Patharpratima.

25. Do you have any suggestions on how Asha can be a positive influence in changing the education scenario in India?

- Asha's ongoing support for promotion of education for these marginalised children of remote part of Sundarban Island are giving the opportunity to learn and being responsible citizen in future. We would like to introduce digital education and english vocubulery items to create more interest among these 1st generation learning childen.
- We would like to hire upperqualified teachers [particularly for Angikar Kishalaya Niketan] to create more impact on education and particularly for introducing english specking skills among students.
- Constuction of a school building at Mallickpur for creating child friendly school environemnt.

 We do suggest to create quaterly reporting format for regular tracking and monitoring of progress.
