PART A: Particulars about the organization and its environment (cross-validation of information presented in proposal)

1. Tell us about the project?

SAIS Basundhara is a residential school for orphaned/abandoned children and its prime objective is to provide girls basic facilities of food and shelter along with quality education. The school is located at Gatiroutpatna in Cuttack district of Orissa. They conduct classes from pre-school to class VIII. The pre-school is equipped with a play-hall and a play-garden. Mediums of instruction at the primary level are Oriya and English. The children are also taught yoga, art and music. Selected female teachers reside at the hostel along with the children.

2. When was the project of interest started?

The project was established in April of 2010 and Asha Purdue Chapter has been supporting it since 2014.

3. What is the administrative structure of the group (e.g. Board of Directors/Grassroots-based/Volunteer based)?

Bidhu Bhushan Mohanty is our project coordinator and a part time volunteer at Basundhara.

4. Currently, what are the main problems the organization faces for running this project?

Shortage of finances to support the salary of teachers.

5. How many centers/schools does the project run? How many of those were you able to visit?

Both the school and hostel are located at a single location in Cuttack.

The relatives of the children come from not very well-educated backgrounds.

This project supports orphan girls.

5. Why did the parents choose this school over the Government School?

Most of the children are orphans, given shelter by Basundhara. Others, who came from extremely deprived backgrounds have chosen the school because the parents can not take proper care and educationally guide their children in their homes.

6. When you visited, how many children were present in the class?

There are about 15 per class. More than 50 students were present in the school.

7. What is the average age group of the children per class? How are they handling older children that need basic education?

There are 74 students in school from class 1 to class 8th. They have extended education to include 2 girls in class 9th. They are also supporting one girl who completed her education from SAIS Basundhara and joined college. She serves as a part-time teacher at SAIS Basundhara.

8. What is the regular class strength? What is the boy-girl ratio in the school?

It is an all girls school.

There are regular extracurricular activities like morning yoga, afternoon gardening, and drill inside the Basundhara premises.

To obtain education, have a support system, and receive basic needs of food and shelter.

Bidhu Bhushan Mohanty: He is a part time volunteer and spends around 4 hours a day teaching English in the school. He has been volunteering for more than two years.

Suraj Behra: He is a part time teacher who teaches Maths and Science to class 7th and 8th. He also does some other social work. He is also continuing his diploma degree.

Ashish Samal: non-residential teacher

Bhagyasree Rout: She teaches Sanskrit and Social Science.

Rasmita Joganiya: She teaches History and Maths. She has been with the school for a year and has good bonding with kids. She also helps the kids with extra curricular activities like singing, drawing in the after hours.

Jyotirmayee Swain: She teaches Odiya, Geography and History to class 1st to 8th. The teachers help kids with extra curricular activities during weekend and before events like Independence day and Republic day.

Priyadarshini Khandual: She teaches Science, English and Math to class 2nd to 7th.

Dharitri Sahoo: She teaches English, Geography and Odiya. - Sasmita Mohanty: She is a Science teacher for class 4th to 8th.

Jayashree Sarangi: She teaches rhymes and story telling in Nursery. She also teaches History to class 4th, 5th and 7th.

Harapriya Rout: She is a hostel superintendent. She helps kids with their daily routines like morning prayers, tuition, online class (10th class), dinner and craft learning

The hostel superintendent is helped by house mothers, Bandana and Supriya. They also help in teaching when teachers are not in the hostel.

10. How many of them are from the local community?

All of them are from the local community.

11. How many of the staff are women? What are their roles?

There are 7 female teachers and 2 male teachers - Bidhu Mohanty, Ashish Samal and Suraj Behra

12. What is the motivation for the teachers to work in this project (eg. pay, service, etc.)? What are the other employment opportunities that they have in the town/village?

They do it for service, some are involved voluntarily. The teachers are underpaid compared to other schools in the area.

13. Where do they live, and how much they travel to work here?

The female teachers live on-site. Male teachers live out of the campus and travel for classes.

They have varying degrees and their qualifications and experience matches their position in school. The salary is not competitive with other schools in the area and they are having a hard time recruiting new teachers. They have requested an increment in the salary from Rs 500 to 1000 per month.

I was able to look at some classwork. It looked par with what one would expect of the class standard. Some students also recited poems that they have learnt fluently.
