Overview

Educate Girls is a non-profit founded in 2007 that focuses on mobilising communities for girls' education primarily in

India's rural areas

- Operates in Rajasthan, Madhya Pradesh, Uttar Pradesh, and Bihar
- ☐ Focus enrolling and retaining girls in government schools; additionally on improving learning outcomes
- Received the Ramon Magsaysay award in 2025

Overview (continued)

- ☐ Very large scale. According to 2023-2024 annual report
 - Presence in nearly 16,000 villages
 - Enrolled 400,000+ out-of-school girls
 - 260,000 students received their remedial learning curriculum
 - 2023-2024 expenditure was ₹134 Crores (~\$16 million)
- Project Vidya
 - Enrolling girls aged 6-14 years into government schools
 - Accomplished through village level volunteers (called Team Balika) interacting with families
- Project Pragati
 - Started in 2021
 - ☐ Enabling girls and young women aged 15-29 years to complete their tenth grade

Asha SV funding over the years

- Selected as part of Edu Impact 2021, started funding in June 2022
- Original funding for enrollment of girls in primary school (ages 6-14) (Project Vidya)
 - Funding was considered to be "unrestricted" (partner could use funds for their general operations
 - Threshold for funds restricted to a particular program geography was much higher than Asha SV funding
- In 2024, funding switched to Project Pragati school completion for girls/women aged 15-29

Open School Program For Adolescent Girls And Young Women Aged 15-29 Years

Cohort A (April 2025)

Over 15,000 learners in Rajasthan and Bihar focused on exam preparation, following the successful completion of more than 100 Prayas sessions. In Rajasthan, the government unexpectedly preponed exams by three weeks, reducing the exam preparation time for learners. Our teams responded swiftly to this development and ramped up support by distributing academic kits, conducting three rounds of mock exams across six subjects, and providing accelerated field training to ensure our learners felt confident and well-prepared. In Bihar, while the state government has yet to announce the exam schedule, our teams are keeping learners engaged through regular mock tests, peer-led discussions, and home visits, ensuring they stay motivated and ready for when the exams are announced.


Cohort B (April 2026)

We onboarded 92 Pragati Coordinators in Rajasthan and Bihar to support the enrolment of 21,045 learners across 27 districts through Camp Delivery. These PCs were recruited through a rigorous multi-step process involving field visits and assignment-based evaluations. These Coordinators received comprehensive training in community engagement, Prerak recruitment, and learner identification to drive effective mobilisation on the ground.

Government Partnerships:

In Uttar Pradesh, Rajasthan, Bihar, Chhattisgarh, Madhya Pradesh, and Telangana—where we have formalised government partnerships—we are advancingkey initiatives such as curriculum review, exam administration improvements, vocational integration proposals, awareness campaigns, and streamlining registration processes. These efforts are strengthening the foundation for robust, state-led open schooling systems. In Assam, West Bengal, Odisha, Andhra Pradesh, Maharashtra, and Jharkhand, we are forging new partnerships, conducting landscape studies, drafting MoUs, and initiating government dialogues, thus laying the groundwork for sustainable, system-level reform.

Project strengths and concerns

- Strengths
 - Project scale is very large and can reach thousands of girls
 - Project has economies of scale, enabling them to reduce the cost incurred per student to achieve project goals
 - Strong connection and alignment with governments
 - Diverse sources of funding
- ☐ Main concern is that Asha funding is too small a fraction of the overall project partner budget
- Additional area of concern may be the overheads incurred by the organization. Program expenses as a proportion of total expenses were about 45% in 2022-2023 and about 40% in 2023-2024
