The usual yearly disbursement from Asha Cornell is sufficient to cover teacher salaries alone, so additional funding sources (specific to BTS Pathabhavan's educational budget and not the other aspects of the organization) are necessary as the school expands. 3. 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#### **PART E: Comments**

After-school program: BTS received Rs. 3,50,000 from Save UK to start an after-school tutoring program, a concern that was identified in the 2023 site visit. Tutoring is offered for two hours in the morning for six days a week, but in the summer, it will increase to three hours. Since regular school hours are 10:30 a.m. - 3:00 p.m. for all students, students and their siblings attend this program so that they can receive extra education and parents can do one drop-off/pick-up. The BTS teachers are the tutors for this

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program. Currently, 45 students are enrolled, and the program can be scaled up to 100-150 students.

BTS centers in north Bengal: BTS expanded to offering two school centers in Alipuday North Block 1 and 2 on January 12, 2024. The parents of the children in this region work at tea estates or are daily wage earners. Currently, these centers have four teachers and 70 children total. BTS plans to expand to four centers in the future.

Computers: Computers in the BTS computer lab (eight total) are assembled and received from Kolkata, and this initiative is supported by Kollol of New Jersey. Kollol does not fund these computers annually, but they donate Rs. 1,50,000 - 2,00,000 when they can to buy a new computer or fix parts. They also support the salary of the computer teacher and expenses for 20 abandoned/orphaned children.

Concern 1: Transportation -- Parents in the area who want to send their children to BTS and the teachers mentioned transportation as a concern. Some villages are 45 minutes away, which is prohibitive for small children who need to make the commute alone. The teachers/Susanta Da said that for Rs. 600 a month, transportation to and from school will be possible. This can be done in two approaches - 1) Rs. 600 per month with a few toto drivers, or 2) buying a car and getting CSR money - Rs. 16-17 lakhs. If transportation is arranged, enrollment to the school should increase by 100 students.

Concern 2: Additional classrooms - the BTS teachers noted that the classrooms are not large enough to accommodate student enrollment, especially for Class V. They mentioned plans to expand the school building and create four more classrooms, a restroom, and a staircase to the upper level, but these plans were not specifically discussed during the site visit.

Concern 3: Post Class V plans - Students typically have to transfer to a government school after Class V, but BTS would like to find ways to support meritorious students who are planning on continuing education. They are looking for individual donations or ways to support these students. They will compile a list of alumni and distribute it to Asha Cornell/individual donors as a starting point.

Concern 4: Teacher training - Because BTS has employed additional teachers, there is a lack of training opportunities, especially in the Joyful Learning Principles. Susanta Da mentioned that someone from a nearby university would be coming to help with this.

Concern 5: Mid-day meal - the funding BTS currently receives from Smile Foundation/individual donations for mid-day meals is not enough for consistent meals. Though kids eat whatever they have at home before coming to school, having a regular mid-day meal would ensure adequate nutrition for the children and relieve the parents' burdens. Susanta Da said that at least Rs. 6,00,000 - 7,00,000 would be required.

Brief comments from speaking with parents:

- Parent 1 daughter in UKG; 5 minutes away from the school; parent is in farming, mom is a homemaker; parent graduated from bts in 2001, and he feels the quality of the education is better than the surrounding schools; student to teacher ratio is high, so he thinks there could be more teachers
- Parent 2 grandchildren are in UKG and class I; happy with the education that children are receiving; having tiffin or a mid day meal would be helpful
- Parent 3 daughter studied from LKG to class IV, and now she's in class V in BTS; parent also has a younger child who is 3 years old; her husband is a farmer; daughter is very happy to be in the school and would love to be there until class XII if she could
- Parent 4 15 min away walking distance; granddaughter is in class I
