DSS HISTORY

- 1989: Founded by Prof. Rajani Paranjpe and Bina Lashkari in Mumbai
- 1993: Prof. Paranjpe brought Door Step School to Pune
- 1993-2004:
 - Launched School on Wheels bus
 - Reading classes in public schools Grow with Books program started
 - First community learning center started
 - Project Foundation commenced its operations in Pune in 2003
- 2005-2024:
 - Asha Seattle involvement since 2005
 - In-house training center "Parivartan" launched
 - Pune expansion to 400+ construction sites till date
 - Started Teach Them Young program sanitation and eating habits focus
 - Started with Supanth in 2020/2021 for an older age group with a focus on Vocational education and Skill training
 - 2024- Pune branch transitioned to Door Step School foundation

PROJECT FOUNDATION - HOW IT WORKS

- Children of construction workers live with their parents in the labor camps at construction sites
- Government has mandated builders to provide a safe space for the children, while their parents are at work
- To comply with requirement, builders set aside small space within each site where the children can stay safely during the working hours
- However, builders do not provide education or childcare facilities there
- For Project Foundation, DSSF negotiates with the builders to use these spaces as EAC's (Educational Activity Centers)
- Provide necessary school readiness and educational activities to the children
 - Schooling and school readiness is for children 3 years and older
 - Childcare (creche) facility is for children younger than 3 years
- Education Activity Centres operate for 8 hours for six days a week
- DSSF finances 50% of operational costs through Funders/ CSR; Builder finances the remaining 50%

DSSF currently operates in over 70 construction sites across the Pune metropolitan area with a reach of nearly 6500 children

EAC Activities during 2024-25

PRIMARY ACTIVITIES

- <u>Balwadi Class</u> Monthly scheduled activities included To string, Sewing Board, Matching pairs and Differences, Twisting fingers in rangoli, Pair according to use, Pattern, Picture reading, Organ strips. School readiness – 2 children
- <u>Study Class</u> (120 days language skills program) according to the learning levels of each child.
- <u>Reference Class</u> Paragraph reading, Science experiments, Educational language games, puzzles, essay writing, paragraphs writing.
- School Enrolment 8 children enrolled from June 2024 to Mar 2025
- Tracking of Migrated children 33 children could be tracked;
 33 of them are attending schools regularly

- Monthly Projects: Summer, Monsoons, Vegetables, Animals, Festival & Family, Fruits & Flowers, Birds, Your helper
- •<u>Science activities</u>: Color dispersion of light, Air pressure, Volume of liquids, Beam Balance, A self-blooming paper flower, Playing with sticks, Combustion requires oxygen, Float-sink, Making a lung model, Observation of acids & acidic substances
- •<u>Events & Celebrations</u> Labor Day, Environment day, Independence Day, Rakshabandhan, Janmashtami, Children's day, Diwali, Christmas, Republic Day, Science Day
- •<u>Creches activities</u> Daycare, Listening to instructions and following them, Action songs, Picture identification, Beads weaving,
- •<u>Parents Meetings</u> Safety precautions at construction sites, RTE Act rules & Importance of education & parents' involvement how to communicate with children, Homework), Health related awareness during Summer, monsoon and winters. Financial planning, Women's Health and family Planning

Conduct survey identify construction sites, available with a minimum of 15 children and basic amenities

Identify key stakeholders, parents, builders/ contractors and nearby schools

Gather data on learning levels of children

Recruit teachers

Resource Mobilization

Conduct training

Purchase of class set up and educational material

Set up classroom

Balwadi (kindergarten) for 3 to 6 years

Collaborate with local government schools to enrol and integrate children.

Conduct literacy and numeracy classes for 6 to 14 years

Empowerment of parents

Tracking of migrated children to ensure continued education

Support activities for overall development of children

Regular tracking of children's attendance and learning levels to map progress against expected learning outcomes

CLASS TYPES

1. Creche Ages 0-3

- Necessary: both parents work in construction in most cases
- Also allows older children with siblings ages 0-3 to attend

2. Balwadi: Ages 3-6

- o Focus on getting children ready to enroll in formal schools later
- Innovative teaching aids used

3. Study Classes: Ages 6-14

- Once LC students are enrolled in formal schools
- Focus on teaching Marathi in 120 instructional days
- Also to help close gap in science, maths, English etc. at age-appropriate level (RTE)

4. Reference Classes: Ages 9-14

- Quiet place for homework/study and with access to reference books
- Volunteer engagements to include tuitions for school subjects
