Centre 1: Ram ka Godaam

Centre 2: Udal ka Godaam

Both centres are located in an area known locally known as Vivekanand Camp in Chanakya Puri. The landmarks would be the Pakistan Embassy (the community is behind it) and the American Embassy (the community is in front of it).

Centre 3: Naushad ka Godaam

This centre is located in an area locally referred to as Cement Godaam, near the Pilanji village in Netaaji Nagar. The closest landmark is the famous Sarojini Nagar Market.

As discussed in Report 1 and 2, the regularity and rhythm of the classes is critical in the short time that the children are available to us. Innovative teaching techniques and Individual Education Plans will be executed on site. This is the sole, limited and focussed activity planned for the coming year.

The following teaching material and aids were planned as possible additions at the time of writing Report 1. Since, there have been changes in response to the feedback from the ground at the time of implementation. Only additions or items, whose utility has changed, have been mentioned below.

- Textbooks for the teacher Yes
- Story books to circulate amongst the children in the Library period. We have not started work on this
- Photocopy and lamination of work cards a concept borrowed from Bodh Shiksha Samiti wherein a sequential series of worksheets is sourced for each subject taught and they are available

for the students to work on in designated time. - Yes

- A steel trunk to store educational materials No. There is no place where this trunk can be stored. Instead teachers carry the education materials they intend to use, with them everyday.
- We would like to add textbooks for each student. The increase in levels is proving very difficult without structure.

Report by Farozina, educator, on why children dropped out

- At Chintan's Pillanji centre, four children- all siblings- are no longer attending classes. The four are-Jaigun, 11 years old; her brothers Jalaluddin, 13 years; Jabbar, 7 years; and Shakeel, 3 years. Their parents are Rustam Ali and Julesa. All of them work as waste pickers.
- The three older children had been coming to the centre for the past one and a half years.
- Their absence follows the incident below:
 - o 10 days ago, a new family shifted near Jaigun's house in the 'jhuggi' cluster her family lived in. This family had two grown-up daughters, aged 20 and 17.
 - o On 31 July, the elder daughter was bathing outside the house at night while the younger one was sleeping inside.
 - o Jaigun's father Rustam entered his neighbour's house. He kept Rs. 2000 in the younger girl's hand and tried talking to her.
 - o The girl's mother came in at that moment and raised a hue and cry. She and the other neighbours beat Rustam up badly. The assumption was that Rustam had entered the house with the intention of propositioning the girl.
 - o By early next morning, i.e. 1st August, Jaigun's family had moved out of their home.
- It is not yet known where the family has gone. Efforts are on to trace them.

June 2007

Case Study: Marian

Marian has been with Chintan since work first started in Pilanji. After it was noticed that he had artistic leanings, he was made an apprentice of the artist Vivan Sundaram. The money he earned as an apprentice was then used to pay for the time he spared from waste picking as he was trained to be a peer educator. While this worked well for a few months, a couple of months ago, he dropped out of class as well as opted out of his social worker duties. In fact we were quite peeved that he was unable to attend two educator meetings, even though we had expert facilitators for them

When Rajesh came back from his annual leave and after the emergency of the fire was behind us, Rajesh began to pursue Marian in earnest. Regular visits to the community had not resulted in contact with Marian. After a great deal of persuasion over his cell phone, Marian agreed to meet Rajesh.

The meeting made it clear why Marian was avoiding meeting with his mentor. Marian has three elder brothers. The eldest of the three has a family of his own and he was selected by the family to move to the village and farm the little land that the family owns. Recently Marian and the rest of his family here in the city found out that this young man had mortgaged all of the family land and lost all the money that he had got from the mortgage, so that in effect the family lost the land.

This brother and his family are now returning to the city and will become dependent on the rest of the family. Marian has two other brothers, both of whom work but do not contribute to looking after their mother and will not look after their elder brother's family. Marian does not have a father. Thus, Marian stopped coming to Chintan class and also stopped working for Chintan as a community mobiliser and peer educator.

Rajesh has spoken with Marian about getting out of the debt cycle and the poverty trap and how the first step in that needs to be him investing in his education. Chintan has convinced the donor who paid Marian's stipend as a peer educator to pay the same amount to Marian if he just steals an hour away from his family responsibilities to study. Marian has since come to class regularly.

Rajesh's efforts with Marian have also had another effect, which is still unconfirmed, but we hope that we can assist to make his wishes come true. Rajesh spoke to Marian about Amar Jyoti and the visit the children made there for Anti-Tobacco Day and that there is a vocational class there on binding and block printing. With his talent, it is quite possible that with a seed cost of just Rs.10,000, Marian may be able to start an entirely profitable business removed from waste picking.

We have investigated the repercussions this switch may have on his daily schedule, his ability to support his family in the interim and the junk dealer he sells to allowing him to continue living in the community. But there is a new ray of hope and thankfully we have not lost Marian to his troubles just yet. Hats off to Rajesh!!

Marian joined Akshay Pratishthaan's vocational program on Monday the 17th of September, 2007.

Marian's sister was in love with a young man. They chose to take the relationship forward by eloping. The man was charged with kidnapping by Marian's parents, the man was arrested and Marian's sister was married immediately, to someone else of her parent's choosing. The girl ran way from her new husband's home and returned home. The family has decided to get her married again!! The cost of both marriages are to be borne by Marian alone.

Financial Assistance to Students

Fellowships

Three students who come to the Pillanji centre have been provided fellowships by Chintan in association with Sanskriti School, Chanakyapuri. The purpose of the fellowships is to motivate children to attend classes by providing them with The students are- Abdul Rasheed, Keena and Asaad. All three used to work as waste pickers earning approximately Rs. 40-50 per day. On persuasion by teachers at Chintan, they have given this up. In return, they are provided a work opportunity that gives a steady and bigger income, as also the time to attend classes on a regular basis.

- 1. Abdul Rasheed: He collects wet waste from Sanskriti School every afternoon at 4 pm. This earns him approximately Rs. 70 per day. On two days each week, he also collects cardboard, files and paper waste, which gets him Rs. 250-300 per day.
- 2. Keena- He goes to Sanskriti School once a month to collect old newspapers. He earns Rs. 300 per month through this. Keena was given a fellowship later than Abdul, who had by then been allotted work at the school. Hence, at the moment, his work and income is comparatively lesser. Keena has been attached to Sudha, a donor who collects newspapers on a monthly basis. Keena picks them up from her residence, sells them and uses the money for his travel to Amar Jyoti.
- 3. Asaad: He collects waste from ex-Prime Minister Mr. Atal Behari Vajpayee's house every Tuesday. He earns Rs. 200-300 per week.

Emergency Action

There was a fire in the Udal Godaam community on the 7th of May, 2007.

By the 14th of May there had been 4 deaths, all from one family. Inspite of timely support provided by the warehouse owner as well as Chintan, several families decided to leave the community for their village. Their date of return was undecided. Several have still not returned.
