PEOPLES' ACTION FOR LITERACY AND SELF HELP (A Programme of Development of Poor Tribal Children and their Communities)

I <u>Background of the Project</u>

This PALAS Project is 10 years running. And we hope to continue offering this vital service to the education of poor, tribal children and the development of their communities. This Project-Programme involves setting up a MODEL of NON-FORMAL EDUCATION for Literacy, Numeracy, Environmental Care, General Information, Self-Expression Exercises and SUSTAINABLE AGRICULTURAL DEVELOPMENT.

Why?

Because education does not reach the poor in our area of Mission-service. Even if some structures of education are set up by the government their content of syllabus and often, their communication methods, do not suit the needs of poor tribals. Our PALAS Programme tries to remedy the lacunae in the educational system.

How?

We have researched and developed a need-based syllabus and curriculum; with a compendium of attractive teaching aids; and training of local, tribal youth to conduct the learning programme. We secure peoples' participation in the process. We have integrated in the learning programme the whole field of SUSTAINABLE AGRICULTURE so that the poor, rural learners and their communities may adopt and adapt better practices for greater productivity to meet their needs for food, education, medicine, shelter, social justice.

II Children and Other Learners in the Project

The poor Children Learners and others who benefit from our Programme live very frugally off the earth. Their's is a Subsistence Economy. The landless among them migrate seasonally for wage-labour. Even drinking water is scarce. Medical help is distant and inadequate. Rainfall is erratic. Agriculture is a struggle. But agriculture is their best hope in the circumstances.

The Children Learners' ages range from 4 ½ to 13. But these are regular learners. Besides them, youth and adults, among them girls and women, often use our teaching-learning material, to gain useful information, to widen their knowledge or advance in literacy and numeracy.

Out of 400 children whom we work to educate nearly 250 will be girls.

III Activities under the PALAS Project

- 1. Motivating poor, tribal parents to send their children to the Learning Programme.
- 2. Developing suitable syllabus, teaching aids and communication methodologies.
- 3. Training of local tribal youth to function as teachers and community workers.
- 4. Holding special information and demonstration sessions on Sustainable Agriculture.
- 5. Using the learning centers as a base for women's development, health work, etc.
- 6. Seasonal micro-watershed programmes for environmental restoration.

4. Motivation, Networking, Community Mobilisation

This vital function of keeping the 25 centres networked, meeting regularly with the villagers, reaching learning materials to the classes, where even public transport is not available needs jeep travel averaging 60 kilometres daily @ Rs. 4.50 per kilometer over 250 working days annually.

Travel and transport costs = Rs. $4.50 \times 250 \times 60$

Please note that the increase in budgeted expenses from previous years is due to increase in prices since the last budget was made two years ago.

We have continued to integrate Health with Development in the Educational Programme.

VI Contribution of the Beneficiaries to the Programme

In promoting the contribution of Beneficiaries to the running of the Programme it must be borne in mind that this practice is often at variance from the totally free assistance some other organizations and even the State offer. WE BELIEVE that motivating a community, however poor, to offer some of its own resources to any development programme is a self-respecting and sustainable way of progress. Thus the programme becomes more accountable to the community and viceversa.

Whatever we recover of costs from the community is used for the progress of the programme itself.

Community contribution to the programme is as follows:

1. Contribution towards Learning Materials

Each learner is provided with a slate, a primer text (when required), colour crayons, pencils, etc. approximately costing Rs. 25/- per head. Such learning materials are purchased at cost from our travelling shop (on Jeep).

Contribution of 400 children to purchase of Learning Materials @ Rs. 25 x 400

Rs. 10,000

2. Contribution of Learners/Parents towards Teachers' Stipend Each learner pays Rs. 4 per month for 10 months. Totalling: 400 learners x Rs. 4/- x 10

Rs. 16,000

3. Communities Contribution of Rent-Free Village Premises for the Centres

Rent estimated at Rs. 150 per month for 10 months

Rs. 41,250

4. Miscellaneous Contribution of Community to Programme

In some cases residence for the teacher is provided free.

Or the costs of the sustainable agricultural inputs or the health materials is paid for. However such contributions are not estimatable at this stage.

Total Estimatable Contribution of Communities:

Rs. 67,250

VII <u>Continuation & Viability of the Programme</u>

We hope that this initiative of ours which we have sustained over 10 years to date, will find support, as it has so far, and elicit more community resources.

We do not need expensive equipment or buildings. We invest in poor but capable people and their children. In addition to the above programme we initiate watershed development, credit unions, women empowerment.

The PALAS Programme offers a model for rural development that has been well tested in the hills of Shirpur among the poor tribal community living there.
