<u>Site Visit – KHUSHBOO WELFARE SOCIETY (Gurugram, Haryana)</u>

The site visit for Khusboo Welfare Society (KWS) for 2022 was conducted on 25th May 2022. We had arrived at the school premises at 11:30 hrs., and the visit concluded at 13:30 hrs.

We were once again greeted by one of their key security personnel, Sahdev, who greeted us and guided us towards the administration block. We then met with Mr. Vijay Pal (Director – Administration), who just came towards his room after inspection of the premises. He then took us inside the main cabin, where we had the chance to meet Mr. Rakesh Jinsi (President & CEO). We introduced ourselves, and sat with Mr. Rakesh Jinsi and Mr. Vijay Pal to discuss in brief about the updates within the school, how the pandemic brought changes in the overall operations and how has KWS been able to steer itself from this dynamic situation. Mr. Rakesh Jinsi explained that the initial phases of lockdown introduced during the outbreak of COVID-19 did have an overall impact to the school, both in 2020 and half of 2021. However, towards the end of 2021 and post the winter break in January 2022, the school has been functioning at its maximum capacity. Mr. Rakesh then asked us if we would like a tour of the premises, and as always Mr. Vijay Pal was more than happy to give us a walkthrough of all the changes that were implemented since our last visit in September 2019.

We then exited the administration block and proceeded towards the different classes in the following phases to understand the different changes, as compared to our previous visit:

OUT-PATIENT DEPARTMENT



- Segment caters to children below the age of 6 years
- Teaching methodology similar to mother-toddler programme in pre-schools

Duration of the class

- Conducted four days a week Monday, Tuesday, Thursday, Friday, and first and fourth Saturdays of every month
- Timings 9:30 hrs. to 12:30 hrs.

Observations noted

• Being a weekly holiday, no activity was observed

Additions

- Tables and reading materials specific for pre-schoolers, which were donated by Ms. Akansha
- Mr. Vijay Pal showed us training kits sent by the National Institute for the Empowerment of Persons with Intellectual Disabilities, Secunderabad
- The four different kits for ages 3-16 years would be utilised by the staff and students for better development. Mr, Vijay Pal underwent a formal online training to ensure correct and optimal utilization of these kits

CARE BUDS

Description

- Segment caters to children between the age of 6 14 years
- Care programme for children with severe disabilities

Duration of the class

- Conducted five days a week Monday to Friday, and first and fourth Saturdays of every month
- Timings 9:30 hrs. to 14:30 hrs.

Observations noted

• Three students were being cared for and trained under the supervision of special educator Ms. Reena and two assistant staff

Additions

• No additions were observed in the class

MARIGOLD

Description

- Segment caters to children between the age of 11 14 years
- Students are trained to independently perform routine task

Duration of the class

- Conducted five days a week Monday to Friday, and first and fourth Saturdays of every month
- Timings 9:30 hrs. to 14:30 hrs.

Observations noted

• Activity of buttoning, unbuttoning as well as folding sample shirts was given to students. This helps them to gain more independence in managing routine tasks

Additions

- Collaboration with Amity University, wherein postgraduate students undertake their internship on social projects as part of their university curriculum. We observed and spoke to a student, who was guiding a young boy in folding the shirt given to him as the core activity
- The internship started in the month of April 2022, and it was their last day on the day of our visit to the school

LITTLE LILLY

Description

• Segment caters to children between the age of 6 - 14 years

Duration of the class

- Conducted five days a week Monday to Friday, and first and fourth Saturdays of every month
- Timings 9:30 hrs. to 14:30 hrs.

Observations noted

- Students were engaged in multiple activities a set of students were involved in arranging number flash cards in sequential order. Two students were engaged in colouring activities. Another set of students were involved in stacking rings in a orderly manner.
- Ms. Monika then instructed the students to go for handwash time, before the recess began

Additions

• No additions observed compared to previous visit in September 2019

BLOOMING ROSE

Description

- Segment caters to children between the age of 11 14 years
- Students in this group are more independent, and have higher abilities in terms of learning and comprehension

Duration of the class

- Conducted five days a week Monday to Friday, and first and fourth Saturdays of every month
- Timings 9:30 hrs. to 14:30 hrs.

Observations noted

• Students were learning the Hindi alphabet with the special instructor using the projection board, and answering the question asked

Additions

• No additions observed compared to previous visit in September 2019

OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY

Description

 Segment caters to children for development of their physical, sensory as well as cognitive issues

Duration of the class

- Conducted five days a week Monday to Friday, and first and fourth Saturdays of every month
- Timings 9:30 hrs. to 14:30 hrs.
- Class batches are prepared, on the basis of requirement and severity of the condition of the student. Students who are in their advanced stages of OT are part of a bigger batch of 5-6 students, where they also act as monitors for junior students

Observations noted

• No activity was performed because of recess time

Additions


- Mr. Lalit, the occupational therapist, showed us support ropes installed in the therapy room for students to regain their arm strength and help in maintaining their posture
- On the day of our visit, a new electric horse riding machine was received by the school. The purpose of the machine is to assist students to maintain their posture and balance. The machine would be implemented as part of the therapy in due course
- The school also received a trampoline to be incorporated as part of the occupational therapy programme

PHYSIOTHERAPY



• Segment caters to all children who require therapy for development of their physical motion as well as gait

Duration of the class

- Conducted five days a week Monday to Friday, and first and fourth Saturdays of every month
- Timings 9:30 hrs. to 14:30 hrs.

Observations noted

• No activity was performed because of recess time

Additions

- Mr. Vijay showed us two additions in the physiotherapy room:
- A new balance board has been acquired by the school to help students in maintaining their physical balance. It is akin to a surf board but smaller in dimension
- A static exer-cycle (known as Air Bike) has also been acquired by the school. The cycle includes both pedalling as well as cross rowing motions to effectively increase the physical strength of students

MULTIPURPOSE HALL

Description

• The multipurpose hall is primarily used to conduct sports and entertainment activities such as yoga, dance as well as music

Duration of the class

- Conducted five days a week Monday to Friday, and first and fourth Saturdays of every month
- Timings 9:30 hrs. to 14:30 hrs.

Observations noted

• The music class was being conducted during our visit. A batch of eight students were rehearsing a popular Hindi prayer song, "Itni Shakti Humein Dena Daata" (translated to Give us so much strength, O lord)

Additions

• A new sound system has been acquired by the school, which replaces the previous sound system observed during our previous visit. The new sound system is capable of wireless integration with the teachers' smartphones, so that they can seamlessly connect and start the audio for dance and music classes

COMPUTER LAB

Description

• The computer lab is used to help students get acquainted with computer technology. Students primarily learn how to operate the desktop, use multiple applications pre-installed in the system, and some are even trained to work on graphic and content creation and design

Duration of the class

- Conducted five days a week Monday to Friday, and first and fourth Saturdays of every month
- Timings 9:30 hrs. to 14:30 hrs.

Observations noted

• The students were working on instructed to begin their work on MS-Paint, as part of their computer lab session

Additions

- The school has changed the exising wired hardware such as the keyboard and mouse, and replaced them with wireless equipment as part of their replenishment exercise
- During peak summer season, with constant electricty fluctuations, the backup usually takes a few minutes to start and reboot the system. In order to reduce the time lag, the school has installed an inverter system to provide constant power to the desktops

With our tour of the complex over, we walked downstairs to the administration block. We sat with Mr. Rakesh and Mr. Vijay to discuss certain questions over tea. The gentlemen asked us if we observed any differences compared to our previous visit three years ago, and it is pertinent we mention that KWS has been able to manage and sustain itself in this unpredictable situation, which has impacted the entire globe. However, managing the operations of the school during this period was not without its own set of challenges and setbacks. We have tabulated the discussions held below:

	• Parents of many students have expressed their anxiety in sending their children to the school. Mr. Vijay mentioned that many families have relocated to their hometown, while certain parents expressed their insufficiency in payment of fees, due to ill-health or job losses. This has led to a slight drop in the overall strength of the school	• As part of their action plan, the school has visited homes of certain students to give the parents assurance of their children. They are in constant touch with the students and their parents, and they have assured them of the best possible practices to ensure the development of the child is not hampered
